
Charles Simkins

Charles Simkins, the eldest of the four Simkins brothers, was born in Sneinton in 1882.

In the 1901 census he was listed as a 'farmer's son' living at Adbolton.

Early in 1907 he married Lillian Beale and by 1911 he was working as a

brewer and living with his widowed father-in-law John Beale, an innkeeper, his wife and sons Charles aged 3 years and George aged 2 at the Dog and Pheasant in Radford.

Following the unexpected and tragic death of Charles Simkins senior, a retired farmer, at Adbolton House in December 1924, there is evidence to prove that Charles Simkins junior was living at 'The Farm' in Adbolton in 1927 and in 1930. It was a milking farm.

Charles Simkins of The Farm, Adbolton died on 20th August 1951 at the General Hospital, Nottingham and was survived by his widow Lillian.

The 185th was a siege battery equipped with heavy howitzers sending large calibre high explosive shells in high trajectory plunging fire.
